REPORTING THE USE OF PUPIL PREMIUM WILSTEAD LOWER SCHOOL 2015/16

Overview

The Pupil Premium ensures funding reaches the pupils who need it.

The funding allocated is to Local Authorities and schools with children from Reception to Year 11 who are:

- Eligible for free school meals (FSM)
- Looked after
- Have parents in the Armed Forces.

In 2011/12 the funding allocated was £488 per child, £200 for families in armed forces. This increased to £600 and £250 respectively in 2012/13. From April 2012, pupil premium funding was also extended to include all children eligible for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years. In 2013 to 2014 pupil premium increased to £900 per child. In 2014 to 2015 funding for the pupil premium schools was £1,300 per pupil of primary-school age. This year, 2015 to 2016, funding for the pupil premium will be £1,320 per pupil.

Total amount allocated to the school for the current academic year.

£19,800 has been allocated to Wilstead Lower School for the current academic year.

Explain how the previous year's allocation was spent?

Impact

Employment of resident artist and specialist teachers to raise ability and confidence for PP children. £4000.

The children worked with a resident artist and created a mural to present to the school, they participated in a variety of workshops and widened their knowledge of artist styles. There were visits from workshops for Black History month, Chinese New Year and Comic Book art. As well as a visit from an opera teacher.

Academic achievement is above national averages for PP children.

Continued staff development. INSET and continued training. £2500

Jigsaw programme of PSHE was introduced to enable high quality teaching of PSHE to help pp children with social and emotional needs.

Staff sent on Designate officer training to enable the school to have more than the recommended allocation of DPs (As some PP children are on the CP register)

Staff attended training aimed at boosting participation in lunchtime activities.

Since these measures have been taken the incidents of bullying,, racial abuse, fighting have reduced during playtimes and children are more understanding and accepting of each other's needs and situations.

Hiring of teacher for booster one to one and small group work. Lucy Bland's wage £16,415

Pupil premium children are performing above or at the same level as other children at the school and there are no significant gaps academically.

O-Track software £600

Class teachers are aware of this group and able to track their progress compared to non pp children

Allocation for Current years funding

Employment of resident Musician and specialist teachers to raise ability and confidence for PP children. £2500

Continued investment in the Jigsaw programme enabling us to teach it going forward as a primary school. £850.

Continued employment of 1:1 and small group teacher to support pupil premium children academically and emotionally £16,415
